Asia Lanka Social Development Cooperation (ALSDC) was registered at NGO secretariat of Sri Lanka under the registration no: L-22901 in 2001. ALSDC is a Non-governmental organization which has been working on peace and reconciliation for many years. ALSDC is the pioneer of establishing peace and social co-existence among all ethnic groups in Kalutara. ALSDC is managed and decisions are taken by a Director Board (consists of 9 members). As an organization we have been working many activities and projects related to social development. Our areas of work have spread over the fields of Human Rights, social cohesion, religious co-existence, social co-existence, peace and reconciliation, social rehabilitation, resettlement, fresh water and sanitation, disaster management, disaster risk reduction, environmental conservation, HIV prevention, pre-childhood development, capacity building and awareness raising. We are mainly based in the Kalutara and Kegalle and Districts and apart from that we are conducting our projects in Colombo, Galle, Matara and Hambantota. We will deploy our staff members, (two project managers, two project officers, District coordinators and accountant) and they are well-qualified and have the experience on projects over the Districts of Kalutara, Galle, and Hambantota.

They also have the ability to work collectively and collaboratively with the local and international individual organizations and as well as foreign networks. 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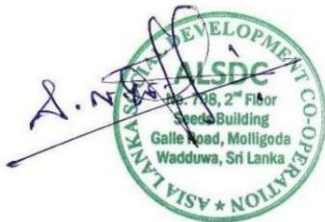
FROM CHAIRMAN/ EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

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## Projects and Activities

### 1.0 Collective Engagement for Religious Freedom

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*The intervention targets the engagement of local inter-religious groups with law enforcement authorities (police) to ensure religious freedom in hotspot areas. Pluralism and Rule of Law will be the two pivots of advocacy. Lessons from the engagement will be advocated at both national and local levels for replication.*

National Peace Council of Sri Lanka is partnering with Asia Lanka Social Development Cooperation to implement the project of Collective Engagement for Religious Freedom in Kalutara district. There are two objectives of the project.

- 1) Collaborative local engagement strengthens commitment to pluralism and Rule of Law to create necessary environment for the practice of Religious Beliefs.
- 2) Inter-faith dialogues provides impetus for advocacy at local and national levels for right to religious freedom within a pluralistic framework for inter religious and inter-ethnic coexistence and non-discrimination

## 2.0. Together we are strong: Inter Religious Youth Council

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There is a need for correct approach in bringing normalcy in the life of Sri Lankans after communal violence and it is clear that the after-effects of communal violence last for long in the Sri Lankan society. Correct and clear methods should be utilized to avoid future conflicts. Basic reasons for clashes must be diagnosed and the total population should be referred to a reconciliation process. In this process, youths, religious leaders and local politicians can be identified as influencers and inter religious community outreach and community engagement can enhance trust between communities.

Ten years after the end of 30 years destructive internal conflict in Sri Lanka is still yearning for long lasting peace. The communities in Sri Lanka are severely divided along with ethnic and religious lines. In the recent years community level incidents have been used to spread conflicts and violence among youth groups. There is a real need to help youths to become peace messengers in their respective communities and overcome community level challenges in non-violent ways through strong interfaith relationships. The Inter Religious Youth Councils engage young leaders, initially in Beruwala and Negombo those considered potential hot spot for religious tensions among youth groups. The project is funded through KAICIID fellowship grant and MasterPeace foundation Sri Lanka. The project looks to focus on interfaith relations among youth leaders as a way to enhance resilience of the local communities to violence and hate. 35 young people in division from four major faith groups will be provided with opportunity to connect, build understanding and trust, and receive training on Pluralism, Inter Religious Dialogues focused on interfaith relations. They will have opportunity to dialogue with one another on issues affecting the communities, identify ways to continue inter religious youth council which will become a platform of promoting inter religious dialogues.

*The project looks to focus on interfaith relations among youth leaders, religious leaders and local politicians as a way to enhance resilience of the local communities to violence and hate.*

### 3.0 Collective Engagement for Religious Freedom /CERF)

*The intervention of DIRC targets the engagement of local inter-religious groups with law enforcement authorities (police) to ensure religious freedom in hotspot areas. Human Rights, RTI, Pluralism and Religious freedom will be promoted. Lessons from the engagement will be advocated at both national and local levels for replication.*

National Peace Council of Sri Lanka is partnering with Asia Lanka Social Development Cooperation to form District Inter-religious Committees.

The objectives of the project are;

- 1) Collaborative engagement of council members in promoting pluralism and Rule of Law to create necessary environment for the practice of Religious Beliefs.
- 2) Building peace and reconciliation in Kalutara District

#### 4.0. District Inter-religious committee

ALSDC was successful in building peace and reconciliation in Kalutara involving District Inter-religious committee in 2018. Monthly assemblies were conducted. Awareness raising programmes, trainings sessions and workshops were organized for Community Policing groups and government officials. Especially the District Secretariat gave their concept and continuous contribution to make the whole programme success.

*The project mainly focuses on reducing ethnic and religious conflicts and insurrections over Kalutara District by building peace and harmony among all ethnic groups*

They were educated on Right to Information (RTI), constitution, and Human Rights. They committee members engaged in exposure visits and education programmes. Under the facilitation of lawyers, various programmes on Domestic violence were conducted. Main outputs were to strengthen the local Inter Religious Committee and establishing Strong District Inter-religious committee. The programme cost was Rs. 110,000.00.



## 5.0 Action for Religious Co-existence /ARC

*The intervention of Local Inter-Religious Committee targets building peace and reconciliation in Beruwala through the intervention of government officials, community policing committees, religious leaders, CSO representative and youth community.*

Asia Lanka Social Development Cooperation is partnering with National Peace Council of Sri Lanka to establish peace in Beruwala through the intervention of Local Inter-religious committee.

The objectives of the project are;

- 1) Collaborative engagement of council members in promoting pluralism and Rule of Law to create necessary environment for the practice of Religious Beliefs.
- 2) Building a coercive dialogue on the peace and reconciliation in Beruwala DS division

## 6.0. Local Inter-religious committee (LIRC)

ALSDC was successful in building peace and reconciliation in eight selected DSDs including Beruwala. The group of inter-religious committee consists of civil society representatives, religious leaders, government officials and Police officers (community policing). We have been working for two years in the areas where having risk to conflicts. All of these activists including youth have decided to educated on this project and get help from policy compilers, reputed religious leaders and national level decision makers.

*The project mainly focuses on reducing ethnic and religious conflicts and insurrections over Beruwala DS divisions by building peace and harmony among the grass- root level community*

We have already conducted the trainings on rule of law and pluralism exposure visits, exchange programmes and drug

Prevention programmes for religious leaders, community groups and youth in the area to change the conflicting structure. We identified the bad trends among the youth such as wrong social media usage and drug addiction and took actions to prevent them. We identified the misunderstandings among different



ethnic groups and built up mechanisms to stop them. The rule of law trainings mainly aimed to exercise the correct rule in a correct way with protecting all the rights of Sri Lankan people. Pluralism aims to teach the beneficiaries how to live with all the ethnic groups in the country in peace and harmony.

The total programme cost was Rs. 1,110,000.

## 7.0 Building up LNGOs' capacity to engage in disaster management

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*The intervention of Local Non-Governmental Organization networks established in Kalutara District mainly aim to work on preparing before a disastrous situation and post-disaster situation through early warning and rapid response mechanisms*

Asia Lanka Social Development Cooperation is partnering with Asia Disaster Preparedness Centre (ADPC) to establish rapid response mechanisms to face disasters.

The objectives of the project are;

- 1) To form Local Non-Governmental Organization networks (LNGO) to act on pre and post disastrous situations in Kalutara District
- 2) To get the government and LNGO incorporated to work on emergency situations
- 3) To produce an master action plan to work before and after disasters occur

## 8.0. Local NGO Network

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ALSDC was successful in building the Local NGO networks in Kalutara district. Totally 5 DS divisions were selected and 25 active civil society organizations were identified from each division. They were encouraged to work on emergency situations in cooperation with government officials in the area. As the introduction programme, two-day training session on camp management was conducted.

Three-day GPS and mapping training was conducted at District Secretariat, Kalutara. Training programmes on First aid and early warning systems were conducted in Bulathsinhala. A preparedness centre was built up in Bulathsinhala accessing all

The members of LNGO network and facilitating to accommodate victims. Monthly Meetings and trainings were conducted for the government officers to raise the awareness and educate on the response mechanism. As a result, the strong knowledge was developed among the civil society members; about the disaster management Total cost for the programme was Rs. 950,000.00.

*The project mainly focuses on preparing the community before and after a disaster through a sustainable mechanism which can be fixed whenever a situation occurs*

## 9.0 Promoting & supporting for developing the quality Education

*The intervention of ALSDC in this project mainly aims to support for developing the quality of the education system in Sri Lanka through research and education programmes.*

Asia Lanka Social Development Cooperation is partnering with Coalition for Education Development (CED) to develop the standard of the education system and level of education in Sri Lanka

The objectives of the project are;

- 1) To form Local Non-Governmental Organization networks (LNGO) to act on pre and post disastrous situations in Kalutara District
- 2) To get the government and LNGO incorporated to work on emergency situations
- 3) To produce an master action plan to work before and after disasters occur

## 10.0. Research on quality education development

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ALSDC was successful in doing research and programmes with CED to develop the current education system aligned with the theme of equal and quality education for all under UN sustainable development goals.

ALSDC conducted trainings and education conferences with civil society organizations for school staff and school development committees. Further, they conducted programmes on SDG for World Children's Day 2018.

Total project allocation was Rs. 240, 000.

*The project mainly focuses on providing equal opportunity for all the children in Sri Lanka who is in between 5- 18 with a quality education*

## 11.0 Building Local Capacities to Engage in Truth, Justice and Reconciliation Process in Sri Lanka

*The intervention of Truth Reconciliation Forums is to establish peace and reconciliation in the area through the concept of Transitional Justice (TJ).*

Asia Lanka Social Development Cooperation is partnering with Institute for Social Development (ISD) to establish the peace based on the past experience and success stories

The objectives of the project are;

- 1) To increase knowledge on Transitional Justice among the educated community and educate the ignorant community
- 2) To get the contribution of government officers, civil society leaders, youth, religious leaders and women

## 12.0. Truth and Reconciliation Forums (TRF)

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The truth and reconciliation forum was established in Kalutara with the participation of youth, women, government officials, religious leaders and CSO leaders. ALSDC was successful in doing awareness raising programmes, Trainings of trainers and workshops on TJ for the core group members. Youth camps were successfully organized. Monthly discussions and meetings were held with the community members.

The information on oral history and missing person was collected with the involvement of the forum members in coordination with office for missing person (OMP).

The forum members were educated on Right to information commission and act (RTI).

Total project allocation was Rs. 307, 000.

*The project mainly aims to establish peace and reconciliation with the active participation of core group members*

### 13.0 Ensuring accountability and transparency in local governance and empowering women political leadership

The objectives of the project are;

- Develop the capacity and knowledge of first time female councilors from selected 10 local government councils, to make their representation certain in the policy making process
- Strengthening the civic activism to make the local governance accountable through forming four 'Right to Justice Active Citizen's Front' of Beruwala, Kalutara, Panadura and Bandaragama

#### **Achievements (Phase I & phase 2)**

25% female representation in the local councils is among the election pledges that came to fruition over the last three years. These legislative changes are yet to take root. The benefits of these mechanisms aimed at strengthening the citizens in their relationship to the state are gradually reaching the population. The civil society actors in Sri Lanka who played a crucial role in bringing these issues to the agenda and ensuring their legislative endorsement after 2015 have a big role to play in ensuring its wider reach. This project will work on effectively using the opportunities afforded by the law to improve governance at the local level in Kalutara. The local government elections of 2018, the first to be held after the amendment requiring a mandatory 25% female representation in the council, has resulted in a large influx of first timer women councilors.

*The intervention of ALSDC targets to increase the accountability and transparency of the local governance through enhancing civic activism and ensuring women's rights. Under the USAID, ALSDC is currently implementing the project in Kalutara District focusing mainly on female beneficiaries. The major purpose is to strengthen the female voice at the national level decision making process by ensuring their prevalence and representation in the political arena.*

Even though there seems to be an apparent increase in female political representation at local level, most female councilors are constrained by several obstacles to fully contribute to governance. While many CSOs had worked hard to get women into the council, the challenge now is to empower them to perform. Across the country they are being held back due to lack of experience, lack of awareness of the powers and functions of the local councils as well as due to entrenched patriarchal norms and practices that permeate the Sri Lankan society and politics. Often, they are called on to make up the numbers or are relegated to less influential committees. This has caused many women councilors to feel disillusioned and may prove to be a dampener in future for improving women's political participation.



Across the country this has been recognized as an emerging challenge by councilors themselves but also by the women activists and civil society organizations. Currently many of them are trying out ways of addressing these challenges. While there is an understanding about the common constraints – relative inexperience, lack of knowledge of powers and functions, inherent culture of patriarchy, etc. – there hasn't been a systematic study that captures the experiences of first-time women councilors. The Asia Lanka Social Development Cooperation (ALSDC) had been instrumental in training women and encouraging them to seek political office.



## 14.0 Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (GFATM)

As a key responsible non-governmental organization based in Kalutara District, ALSDC conducts advocacy and provides services for risk populations including MSM, FSW and PWID to foster the National Plan of eliminating HIV AIDS in Sri Lanka by 2025. A team including well-trained officers and Peer Leaders coordinate the service provided by STD clinics attached to Nagoda, Panadura and Horana Hospitals, conduct community-based tests, distribute condoms and HIV self-testing Kits. ALSDC prioritizes gender equality within the organization and develops a broad discourse for the rights and welfare of the LGBTIQ community. ALSDC team is committed to raising awareness and treating TB prevention among high-risk groups



## 15.0 Emergency Interventions since 2021

ALSDC has distributed dry rations among 470 plantation families in the lower part Raigama, Raigama Pura, Raigama Colony, Raigama Part 6, Newchettawal Estate in Ingiriya and Madurawala DS divisions by NTT (Neelam Theruchelvam Trust) for the COVID affected families. Under the IDEA Emergency Response initiative, hygiene packs were distributed among 86 children's homes, adult homes and homes with disabilities in Kalutara District. Apart from that, ALSDC gave off dry rations for 36 children's homes, adult homes and homes with disabilities and undergarments for 26 children's homes. Based on a selection criterion, dry rations were distributed for 50 low income families. With the financial support of PAFFREL, the cash grants were disbursed among 18 individuals belonging to low income and diseased families. In collaboration with the Centre for Humanitarian Affairs (CHA) sewing machines were distributed among selected 08 marginalized women. Wash basins, 150 PPE kits and spray machines will be distributed among the six government institutes next week. With the contribution of MAS, 31000 KN-95 masks will be distributed among selected schools in Kalutara District.



## 16.0 RTI Hub in Kalutara District

ALSDC in collaboration with TISL (Transparency International in Sri Lanka) has formed RTI hub in Kalutara district and ALSDC is acting as the coordinator and facilitator of the RTI hub. Two main awareness programs were undertaken regarding RTI for youth in Kalutara district. 60 RTI were submitted to the relevant authorities and organization covering the aspects of land disputes, human rights, sexual and gender based violence, infrastructure issues, emergency situations, minor matters, educational gaps, health concerns, governance related, youth right violations, and transportation. Five RTI succeeded regarding the information request about vaccination program, Requesting information from the National Water Supply and Drainage Board regarding the water project in Baduraliya, Requesting information on the members who are below the age of 40 in the 9th Parliament of Sri Lanka, construction of Road in Sandasirigama, Matugama, etc.

## 17.0 Civil Society Organizations and Community Collectives for Democratic Governance

The project aims to strengthen Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) in Kegalle District, focusing on enhancing advocacy, governance, and regulatory reform. It is designed to build the capacity of local CSOs, engage the community in key governance issues, and promote women's and youth leadership in societal reforms.

Enhance the capacity of 12 selected CSOs through training on finance, government, documentation, and local government services.

Empower Communities by forming action groups( youth and women's group) and facilitating their active involvement in local advocacy on issues such as human rights and Malaiyagam identity.

Facilitate Government - CSO interaction to address identified Community issues and improve local governance through collaborative efforts.

Promote leadership by providing training and creating opportunities for women and youth to take leadership roles in civic and political activities .

*The project focuses on strengthening CSOs and empowering women and youth for better governance.*

The project strengthens 12 CSOs through training, enhances advocacy, and promotes public outreach. It empowers women and youth with leadership training, supports gender equality, and raises awareness on key issues. The goal is to foster civic participation and improve governance in Kegalle District.

The project focuses on empowering CSOs, fostering advocacy for governance reforms, and ensuring active citizen participation. By strengthening CSOs and promoting leadership among women and youth, it seeks to create a more engaged and informed community that can contribute to sustainable social change and improved governance in Kegalle District.



## 18.0 Building Resilient Youth-led Actions for Violent Extremism (BRAVE -PHASE 02)

The "Building Resilient Youth-Led Actions for Violent Extremism (BRAVE – Phase 02)" project focuses on equipping the BRAVE team with the necessary skills and knowledge to prevent violent extremism (PVE) and promote peace.

The project includes various activities such as orientation programs, training workshops, and progress meetings aimed at enhancing the BRAVE team's capacity to mediate conflicts, engage with local authorities, and advocate for PVE.

Additionally, the project seeks to raise awareness among youth about violent extremism, hate speech, and disinformation while promoting positive messaging through social media.

the project focuses on building trust and unity among diverse communities by conducting awareness programs, relationship-building sessions, exhibitions, and legal support clinics for marginalized groups. The initiative also includes educational and artistic activities like art, poem, and debate competitions, along with publishing a PVE-focused magazine.

*The project focuses on strengthening the BRAVE team to prevent violent extremism and foster community trust through training, awareness, and engagement.*

A symposium will be held to share the project's findings with local and national stakeholders, fostering stronger community cohesion and resilience against extremism.



**19.0 Alleviating Disenfranchisement, Violence  
and Oppression on Civilians through Empowerment  
(ADVOCATE – phase 02)**

In ADVOCATE Phase II, the organization will focus on empowering women in these estates by providing economic opportunities through vocational training, entrepreneurship, and self-employment initiatives. The project aims to reduce women's reliance on plantation work, while also offering financial literacy programs and connecting them with microfinance resources.

These efforts will create sustainable economic independence for women, improve their livelihoods, and foster long-term social support networks. The project will introduce financial literacy programs and connect women to microfinance resources, enabling them to manage their finances effectively and access necessary capital for small businesses or personal growth.

Through these efforts, ALSDC hopes to foster long-term social support networks, improve women's livelihoods, and ensure their economic independence, thereby contributing to the overall well-being of the community.

*The project aims to empower women through vocational training, entrepreneurship, and financial support to achieve economic independence.*
